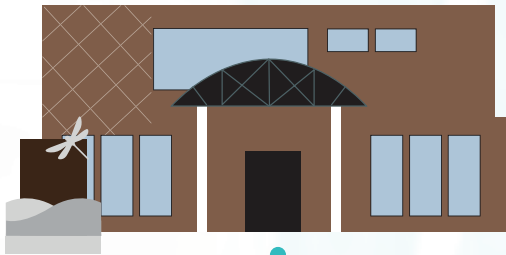

MY PLACE TO BELONG

Nine years ago, Claire Coleman—veteran, marathon runner, and mother—faced a challenge unlike any she had ever known. Her young son wasn't meeting milestones. By his first birthday, he was banging his head and having hours-long meltdowns. By age three, he was asked to leave daycare. By four, banned from a drop-in center.

Claire knew something was wrong, but despite her efforts, she felt dismissed and alone. Then a neighbor invited her to the Discovery Center. It was a long drive from Brentwood, but Claire took a chance.

What she found changed everything: a space where her son could be loud, messy, and joyful without judgment. He splashed at the water table, climbed on the fire truck, and watched the trains for hours. There was space to roam—and space to

breathe. "It was the first place where we could just be us—and that was enough," Claire says.

They returned often. Over time, her son was diagnosed, received support, and began to thrive. Today, he dreams of becoming a biologist in Alaska and still loves science.

When asked if he remembered the Discovery Center, Claire's son said "yes, I had some of the best memories of my life there."

"You opened his eyes to the joy of discovery—and showed us all what acceptance feels like."



IN EVERY PLACE:

Empowering Rural Education Through TRIP



In 2021, the Tennessee Science Alliance, a consortium of museums across Tennessee, joined forces for a bold idea: equip K–2 teachers with the tools and confidence to bring hands-on STEM and literacy learning into their classrooms.

Together, through the Tennessee Rural Impact Project (TRIP), Discovery Center led this consortium and set out to support some of the state’s most underserved rural communities by doing what we do best: bringing wonder, learning, and connection to children, their families, and their teachers.

We knew from the beginning that rural educators were doing incredible work—often with limited resources and little connection to peers. What if our museums could become part of their extended team? What if our resources, creativity, and passion could help meet their unique needs?

A Gathering of Educators: The Heart of TRIP

The highlight of the entire TRIP journey came in July 2024, when educators and community leaders from all our partner schools gathered in Murfreesboro for the “Inspiring Connections in Education” Conference. It was a powerful, energizing event.

For many teachers, this was their first opportunity to connect with others who understood the joys and struggles of rural education. They left with new tools, inspiration, and most importantly, a sense of community.

We also welcomed community members—mayors, librarians, business leaders—who care deeply about their local schools. They joined teachers in special sessions and brainstorming workshops, and together they planted the seeds for real change.

Real Projects, Real Impact

Out of the conference came three incredible Community Impact Projects, designed and led by teams of teachers and neighbors:

- In Whiteville, a new community garden now brings science, health, and collaboration to life for students and families.
- In Grand Junction, STEM Literacy Bins are helping teachers, students, and families explore reading and science with resources available to anyone in the community.
- In Tracy City and North Elementary, educators and locals are working hand-in-hand to install public learning fixtures that tie into the town's rich history.

Each of these projects reflects what TRIP is all about: empowering communities to support their youngest learners in creative, lasting ways.

Looking Ahead

The TRIP project may be wrapping up, but the relationships, resources, and inspiration it sparked are just beginning to grow. Teachers are more connected. Families are more engaged. And our museums are more committed than ever to ensuring every child in Tennessee—no matter their zip code—has access to high-quality, joyful learning.

TRIP showed us what's possible when we work hand-in-hand with our communities. And that journey is far from over.

PARTNERS IN CARE

Animal Care Veterinary Hospital has been caring for critters big and small since 1969, when Dr. George Jackson brought his equine expertise to Middle Tennessee. After treating world champion walking horses, he expanded into dogs and cats, and by the 1990s welcomed Dr. Robert Blaylock and Dr. Kyle Daniel to focus on furry family members full time.

In 1999, Dr. Blaylock and his wife Bonnie bought the practice, expanded the team, moved to a new facility, and in 2008 earned Rutherford County's only AAHA accreditation. That same year, Dr. Daniel began a long-running partnership with the Discovery Center, helping care for its unique animal residents—a mission now carried on by Dr. Kennon Todd.

Animal Care doesn't just heal pets—they help grow future vets, too! Dr. Daniel led the Explorers program for years, inspiring young animal lovers like Dr. Todd, who returned as lead veterinarian in 2024. In 2019,

Dr. Daniel became medical director, and in 2025, longtime veterinary nurse Abigail Flynn became Practice Manager, following the legendary Duke Tidwell, who served in for over 35 years.

Veterinary care is essential to the health and well-being of the Discovery Center's animal ambassadors, who educate and inspire young minds every day. Discovery Center is deeply grateful to the compassionate team at Animal Care Veterinary Hospital, who generously partner with us—often at little or no cost—to ensure the highest standards of care and learning.

Through all of its growth, Animal Care has stayed true to its mission: top-quality care, strong relationships, and a lifelong commitment to both pets and their people.

MY PLACE TO DISCOVER

Chase Spurlock
CEO & Co-Founder, Decode Health

My earliest memories of Discovery Center go back to when it was still called the Discovery House. Our preschool class at First United Methodist would walk over, and I remember racing to the water table or sneaking an extra turn in the flight simulator.

One of my most vivid memories, though, came in seventh grade at The Webb School. For a community service project, my friends and I painted the columns in front of the Discovery House. We took tremendous pride in that painting project because we had all grown up loving the museum. It felt great to give back to a place that had given us so many great memories.

I always had an interest in healthcare, even as a kid, and one activity at the Discovery House stood out: learning how to perform the Heimlich maneuver. Some years later, this proved helpful as I've had to engage this skillset on three separate occasions. After each time, I think about the "training" I received in elementary school.

"Discovery Center taught me that science isn't just something you read about; it's something you do."

That mindset of testing, observing, and refining is the same approach I rely on today as I work at the intersection of clinical medicine, genomics, and data science to advance precision healthcare.



Today, I am a serial entrepreneur working at the intersection of life sciences and artificial intelligence, focused on advancing precision medicine and improving patient care. As the CEO and Co-Founder of Decode Health, I collaborate with leading pharmaceutical, diagnostic, medical device, and technology companies to develop AI-driven solutions that transform how diseases are diagnosed, monitored, and treated. My work has contributed to patented molecular techniques for blood-based diagnostics, AI-powered population studies, and AI-as-a-service platforms that accelerate R&D in precision medicine.

My advice to children visiting Discovery Center today? Try everything, get messy, and keep asking questions. The curiosity you feel now can turn into a career that helps patients, invents new tech, or uncovers brand-new discoveries.

MY PLACE TO LEARN & PLAY

When Shazma Shaban first visited the Discovery Center, she was simply looking for a safe, engaging space for her toddler son to explore while at the same time being able to care for a newborn.

"It went beyond our expectations," she says. "We had no idea such a wonderful resource was available in our hometown."

Over time, the Discovery Center became a weekly tradition—and a second home. It was her son's favorite place to learn and play. Her daughter, now 3.5, practically learned to walk in Tiny Town with

help from her big brother.

Shazma says they have made real connections and lasting friendships with other families and the staff. "It's a great place for other parents and children to connect."

They've celebrated birthdays, enjoyed out-of-town museum visits through the ASTC network, and appreciated the incredible staff at every turn.

MY PLACE TO BE CURIOUS

JOHNATHAN WARNER CAMP COUNSELOR

As a child, Johnathan Warner's first memories of the Discovery Center were splashing at the water table, exploring the lily pad pond, and diving into the Science of Music exhibit. He was just a curious camper then, wide-eyed and energized by the wonder of science and discovery. In 2024, he stood on the other side of that experience — a Campology Counselor helping to inspire the next generation.

Johnathan began volunteering with the Discovery Center's Summer Campology program in 2021. Year after year, he returned — not out of obligation, but because of how meaningful the experience was. "It was a fun way to spend the summer," he said, "and I enjoyed working with the Camp Team."

Johnathan saw camp through a new lens. "I wasn't just behind a blue screen all day. I was learning and teaching STEAM concepts — like circuits and environmental science — in real-time with kids who are just discovering how the world works."

He admits he was surprised by how easy it was to connect with kids, and how often he relied on Camp Coordinator Emmie Enochs. "She prepares you for everything. Don't be afraid to ask for help — the team has your back."

His favorite parts of camp are creek stomping



with the campers and playing hide-and-seek during after care duties.

A junior studying Mechatronics Engineering at Middle Tennessee State University, Johnathan dreams of designing automation systems, especially in aircraft. But no matter where his career takes him, one thing is certain: his journey from camper to counselor has shaped not only who he is, but how he leads, learns, and gives back.

MY PLACE TO GIVE BACK

Two standout teen volunteers have turned their love for Discovery Center summer camps into opportunities to give back. For James Jackson and Madie Gove, summer at the Discovery Center once meant fun experiments, outdoor adventures, and new friendships. Now, it means something more: leadership, responsibility, and the chance to inspire the next generation of campers.

James, 13, is an eighth grader at Central Magnet School—soon to be a freshman. He began volunteering as a Counselor in Training (CIT) to earn service hours, but quickly found deeper meaning in the role.

"I like being someone the campers can look up to," James said.

His favorite memory? "We found a snake in a tree, and all the kids ran over to see it. It was chaotic but so fun."



Madie, 14, a rising ninth grader at Blackman High School, felt drawn back to the Discovery Center by its sense of family. "The staff and volunteers have this really strong sense of community."

"I loved being a camper, and I wanted to help create that experience for other kids," Maddie said.

Both teens share a passion for learning and helping. Madie recalls one camper who arrived crying but left each day grinning. "By the end of the week, she came in hugging everyone," she said. "That's when I knew this really mattered."

From campers to CITs, James and Madie prove that with heart and a little experience, anyone can become a role model.

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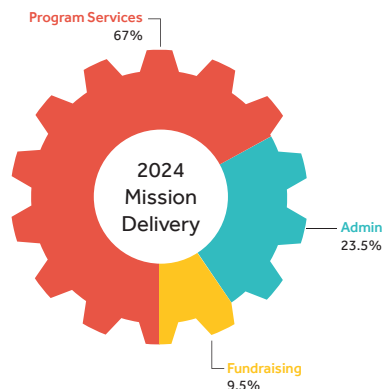
