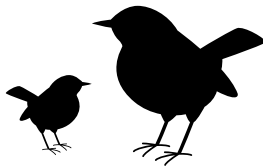

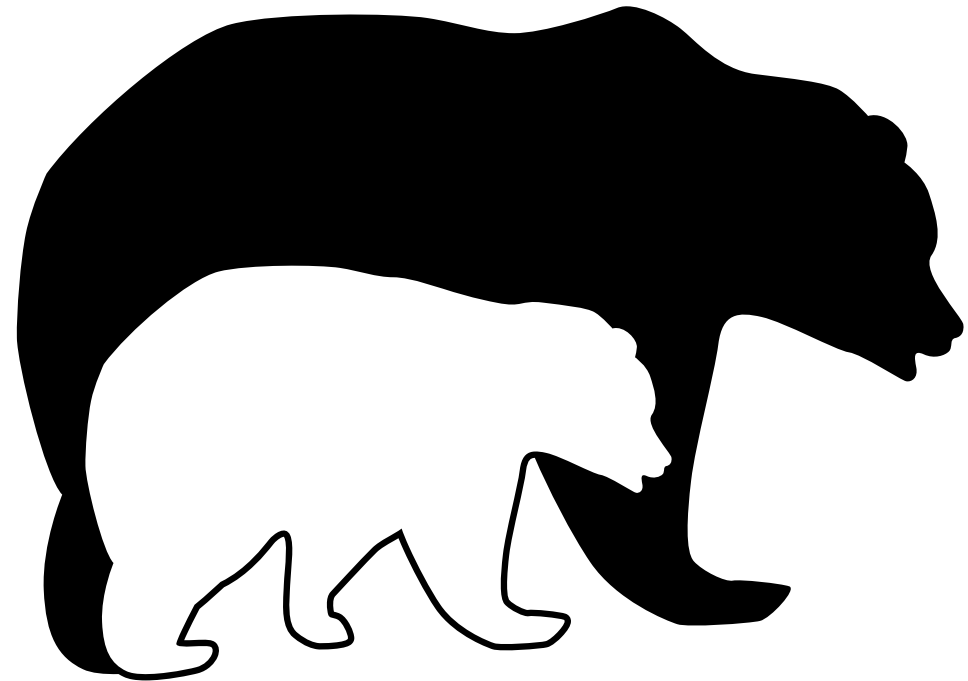

They have the same color, pattern, or shape.

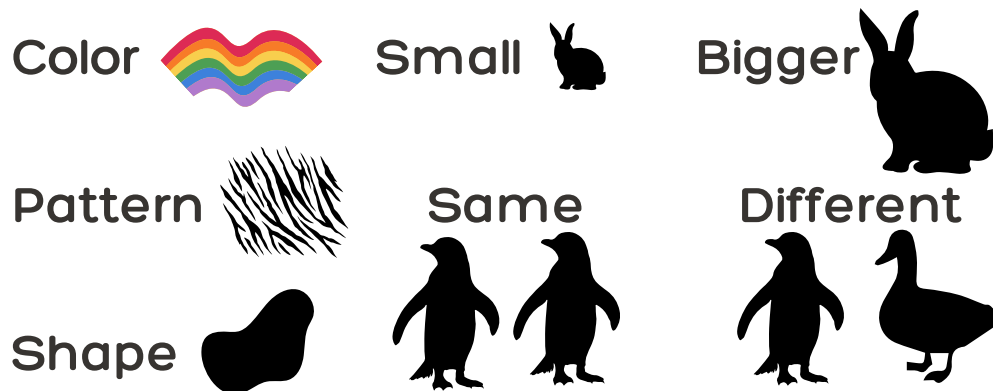
The baby is small and the parents are bigger.
