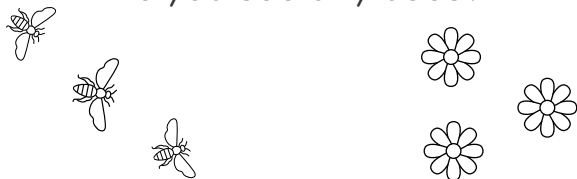

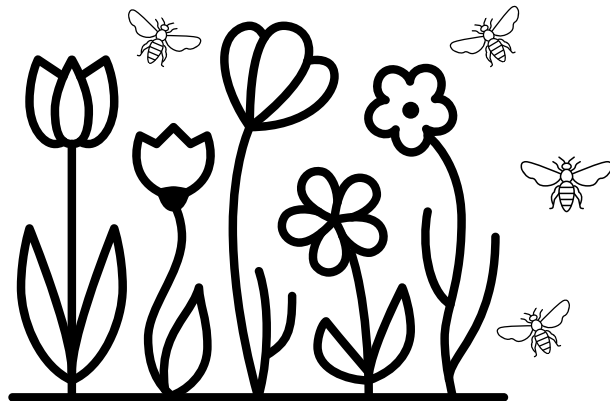

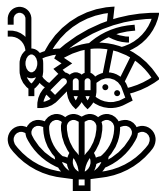
Let's Explore

How Honey Bees Pollinate



Exploring...

Honey bees get what they need to make food from flowers. In a flower there is nectar and pollen.



How does a honey bee pollinate?

1. A Honey bee lands on a flower.
2. Pollen sticks to the hairs on its body.
3. The bee moves to a new flower of the same type.
4. Some pollen falls off onto the flower.
5. The pollen helps the new flower make seeds and fruits.
6. This lets new plants grow!



What to do
