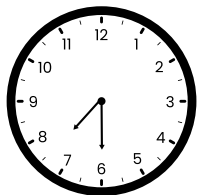
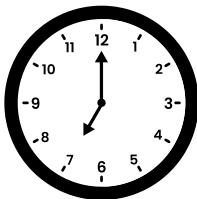

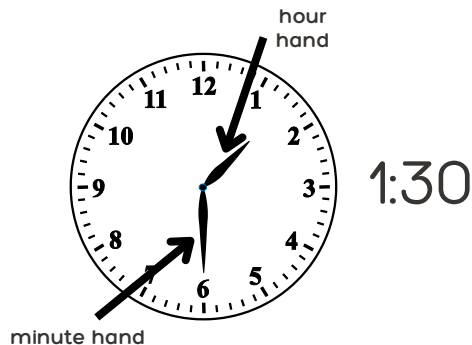

Exploring...

Clocks are how we tell time.
There are two types of clocks -
digital and analog.

Analog clocks have a face with
hands.



The short hand points to the hour.
The 12 numbers count the hours.

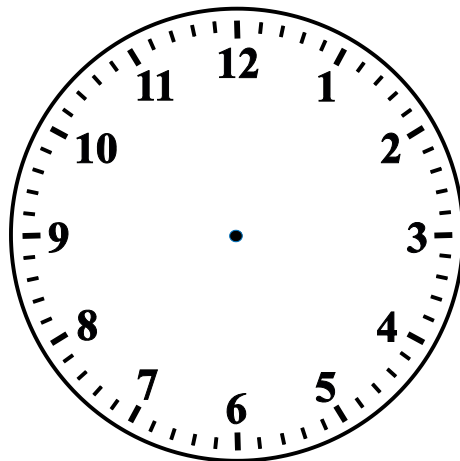
The long hand points to the
minutes. The small ticks count
the minutes.
